The latest figure we have is that our profit was a tick over \$20,000 which is an amazing effort. Attitudes to School Survey

We value student voice as a means to improving student engagement, wellbeing and quality instruction and are conducting a survey to find out what your child thinks of our school. The Attitudes to School Survey is an annual student survey offered by the Department of Education and Training to assist schools in gaining an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Our school will use the survey results to plan programs and activities to improve your child's schooling experience.

We are planning on administering this survey in the week beginning Monday 27 May.

Student Free days

Our next **Student Free Day** for the whole school is early in Term 2 - **Friday 26 April**. On this day our staff will join with teachers from a number of our Network schools to hear from Professor Peter Sullivan on how we can regularly incorporate challenging maths tasks into our weekly lessons. This leaves us with 1 remaining student free day for the year.

Professional Learning Communities - Our School is embarking upon this initiative in 2019

Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) are an approach to school improvement where groups of teachers work collaboratively at the school level to improve student outcomes. PLC schools start from a simple idea: students learn more when their teachers work together. Building a PLC is a proven way for schools to increase student learning by creating a culture that is:

- focused on continuous improvement by linking the learning needs of students with the professional learning and practice of teachers
- committed to professionalism
- Fueled by collaborative expertise.

Child Safe Standards

Our School Council has ratified our Child Safety Code of Conduct policy and a copy is available for viewing on our website. The policy describes the values and principles that will guide the school in developing procedures to create and maintain a child safe school environment, and protect children from child abuse.
