# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT Mr James Whitla

I acknowledge the traditional owners of the lands on which we meet and pay my respects to elders past present and emerging.

Welcome to Term 4.

Term 4 has commenced with great excitement and fanfare. It will be a great term to be around Edithvale Primary as we have a myriad of special events on the horizon. Planning for 2020 has well and truly begun. We are preparing for our next Foundation transition, commencing Graduation rehearsals and starting to set the structures and systems that will continue to make our school great.

**Buildings** - Last week we received a visit from Premier Daniel Andrews and our local MP, Tim Richardson, who came to launch the new STEM facility-building project. They were joined by some of our student leaders, our architects and newly appointed builders for a walk around the school and a chat with some of our students - many of whom were shocked to see someone they usually only ever see on the TV!

We discussed the new building works that will kick off next week and what Stages 2 and 3 of our School Master Plan looks like. It is great knowing that we are on the right path and are engaging with those who can have a positive impact on our school environment.



The Library/STEM facility building works are scheduled to commence on Wednesday 23 October and it is hoped that it will be completed by the start of Term 1 next year. This will cause some disruption along the Edithvale Rd side of our site and I am sure it will all be worth it when we have our new facility up and running next term.

**Emergency Evacuation** - Due to the changes to pedestrian traffic around our school, we will be holding an On-Site Emergency Evacuation Drill prior to the commencement of the building works. We do these regularly throughout the year to help maintain a safe environment and ensure our students and staff are well versed in how to respond in the event of an emergency.

**SUNSMART** - Hats are compulsory here at Edithvale Primary School in Terms 1 and 4. We are a Sunsmart School! Although the weather may be cool, the UV levels are still high so please remember to use sun protection each day during the sun protection times - not just on hot or sunny days.

Class structures in 2020 - We are currently in the process of setting up our 2020 class structures. We will not know for certain what these will look like for a few more weeks and it is most likely that our classes will be in this formation. A number of staff who are currently on extended leave have expressed a desire to return to Edithvale Primary next year, and this means juggling teaching roles to ensure the best possible environment and learning experiences are afforded to our students.

Class Placement - The process that Edithvale Primary School works through to plan each student's class placement begins months before the end of the school year. We understand that in certain situations, parents and carers may like to request that their child be placed with a particular friend or in a particular class.

Edithvale Primary School recognises the importance of fostering and maintaining friendship groups. We also understand that it is equally important for students to mix and learn with peers who have different interests.

If you would like your child be grouped with a particular friend or friends, please discuss this with your child as we will be asking the students to nominate a short list of friends they would like to be with the following year. We will not always be able to accommodate class placement requests, but we will endeavour to take our students' wishes into consideration where possible.

**Requests for placement with certain teachers** - All teachers at Edithvale Primary School are caring and committed educators and Edithvale Primary School strives to ensure that all students are provided with a high quality education.

Whilst we appreciate that you may wish that your child would benefit from being placed in a class with a particular teacher, we are generally unable to accommodate these requests. Our school's leadership team and teaching staff have an in-depth understanding of each teacher's strengths and will always endeavour to place our students with teachers who are best placed to suit their needs. Each year a limited number of teachers move into different year levels to help them grow and develop professionally and a number of staff will also 'share' classes as they opt to work part time when returning from extended leave. We do not re-allocate students to different classes during the school year.

**Mobile Phones** - As you may be aware, the Victorian government has announced a new mobile phone policy that will require students to switch their phones off and securely store them away during the school day.

The policy is designed to support teaching and learning in an environment that is free from unnecessary distractions, disruptions and student inattention caused by the urge to check their phones. At recess and lunch times, students will be better placed to communicate with each other face to face and/or be involved in activities rather than being focused on a device or on social media.

Key elements of the mobile phone policy include:

- A new mobile phone policy comes into effect from Term 1, 2020
- Students will be required to switch off and store phones securely during school hours. Families should contact the school office should you need to pass an urgent message to your children

**Lateness** - Being 30 minutes late to school each day from Foundation to Year 10 adds up to missing the equivalent of one FULL year of school.

Being late to class can have a negative effect on the education of not only those students who are late, but also the other students in the class.

Students who are late miss out on many instructions and information about what is happening, not to mention important learning situations. This means that they have to catch up somehow. It is like being late to see a movie and not being able to understand what's happening because you don't know who the characters are and what the plot is.

Students can feel unsettled, disorganized and unhappy for the rest of the day and it can take them some time to complete and understand the work that they have missed.

We are all human. Cars can break down and unexpected situations can occur. We know that family morning routines are not always straightforward and they certainly are not in our household  $\odot$ . If you are experiencing problems, speak to us, as we may be able to offer suggestions to help.

We are happy to accept that students will be late on the odd occasion because of unforeseen circumstances. However, arriving late on a regular basis has an adverse impact on students' learning and we should not accept this.

## CASEA will be in our school in Term 1 & 2 2020

As part of our Wellbeing Program at Edithvale Primary School, CASEA will be joining us at school EVERY Tuesday. This is a massive fillip for us as only very few schools in our Region are offered this rare opportunity to work with experts in the field of Mental Health

CASEA is a joint program run by <u>Alfred Child and Youth Mental Health Service</u> (CYMHS) and the <u>Department of Education and Early Childhood</u> Development.

The program helps children enhance their self esteem and develop better skills in

- Understanding and expressing feelings
- Building self-esteem and resilience
- Getting on with others

We will be running a small group program with some Foundation to Year 3 students and their families in term 1 & 2 next year. In this way we hope to help children who have problems in these areas to improve their skills and prevent their problems from getting bigger.

The program also involves working with the school, classroom teachers and education support staff and some families across the school from Foundation to Year 6.

The program, including participation in the small groups is free of charge but places are limited. Parents will receive a letter soon explaining the program in more detail. There will also be a questionnaire for parents and teachers to complete.
